### Look Backward to 1943

I was thinking about the events of 75 years ago, July 1943, not that I was there, but I've read about what was happening. The planners called it OPERATION HUSKY, and it was the operation that would launch the West Novas into combat during World War Two.

The West Novas had completed their years of training and waiting. They had guarded the south-west of England and had exercised there for just over three years. Then they trained in Scotland for about three weeks in March 1943, returning on 1 May to complete 90 days of mountain training in the rugged Scottish highlands, where their training was overseen by Norwegian mountaineers. They also concentrated on practising assault landing drills. On 6 June '43, they are inspected by Maj-Gen Guy Simmonds, then the new 1 Can Div Comd, and on 21 June, they are given their first shots of mepacrine, an antimalarial drug (Some things don't change). On the 28<sup>th</sup>, they were at sea and were ordered to wear the tropical gear they had been issued and to put away their battledress. Their orders were sealed and secret, so the rumours must have been very imaginative.

At 2115 on 28 June, the convoy put out to sea, and on 1 Jul, 3 Bde Comd announced that they were part of General Montgomery's 8<sup>th</sup> British Army on their way to invade Sicily in the "biggest combined operation ever conceived." Can you imagine being on that ship and hearing that announcement as you steamed toward the Mediterranean?

Before the West Novas landed on the beach at Pachino on the southern coast of Sicily, the *Devis* was torpedoed and sunk carrying many West Nova vehicles to the bottom. This was not a good start to the operation, but within the next 55 days, the West Novas would earn six battle honours. It's an incredible story, and I encourage you to read about it if you haven't already done so.

#### United States Meritorious Service Medal

The US Meritorious Service Medal is presented by the American Forces to members of the US Armed Forces who perform outstanding meritorious achievement or service to the United States. From time to time, Canadian Armed Forces personnel who work with American formations are recognized for outstanding

service by the award of this medal. Since our last newsletter, two West Nova commanding officers have achieved this honour. LCol Todd Harris and LCol Ken Butterworth have both been awarded this medal in recognition of excellent service working with American units. When worn by Canadian soldiers, this medal will be placed after the CD.

### West Nova Soldiers in Latvia



In early July two West Novas returned from an operational NATO tasking in Latvia. Cpl KDH Himmelman and Cpl DW Baltzer were part of 2nd Bn The Royal

Canadian Regiment for just over seven months (02 Jan 18- 07 Jul 18). They were part of Operation REASSURANCE, the CAF contribution to NATO assurance and deterrence measures in Central and Eastern Europe. Specifically, they were part of the Enhanced Forward Presence Latvia (eFP). Welcome back and thank you for your service on this NATO task.

### **Enhanced Forward Presence Battlegroup Latvia**

In June 2017, the CAF deployed about 450 Canadian Army members to Latvia. The Canadians are leading a NATO battlegroup comprising military members from several nations, including: Albania, Canada, Italy, Poland, Slovakia, Slovenia, and Spain.

This battlegroup works as part of the Latvian Land Forces Infantry Brigade, based at Camp Adazi, Latvia. The current group of Canadian Army members is primarily from the 2RCR, based in Gagetown, NB. Canada's contribution includes headquarters staff, an infantry company with light armoured vehicles, military police, and logistical and communications support.

Some CAF members deployed as part of the eFP BG Latvia took part in Exercise CLAYMORE SOARING from April 4-6, 2018. This air mobility exercise took place at Camp Ādaži, Latvia. Soldiers from Canada, Italy, and Spain—all BG members—took part during different parts of the three-week exercise. The US Army assisted the BG by providing three UH-60 Black Hawk helicopters and air crew. This exercise aimed to foster interoperability and strengthen NATO's deterrence and defence posture.

Throughout the month of May, eFP BG Latvia continued to conduct a broad range of training, and participated in numerous community and outreach events.

NATO has deployed four such battlegroups to the Baltics and Poland. These battlegroups demonstrate the strength of the NATO alliance, and aim to prevent conflict and protect stability in the region.

# WNSR Italy Day Ball May 2018



In May the unit hosted the Annual Italy Day Ball which was quite well attended; there was a delicious spaghetti meal and a good number of door prize draws, including three mini-fridges with the WNSR Camp Flag emblazoned on the door. This was followed by some photos in front of the Canadian and Italian flags flanked the



Regimental and Queen's Colours, and then there was the dancing. What a great opportunity to get dressed up and share some top quality social time with your fellow West Novas. There were about a dozen Association guests there who would be sure to recommend this event in the future.

This was also a time for the Regiment to show their gratitude to two retiring Honorary appointments. Presentations were made to both Colonel Eric Meisner and Honorary Colonel John Leefe. Both had served as HLCol and HCol respectively for the past six years. At this time, both HCol Leefe and LCol Butterworth welcomed the new Honorary Colonel, Don Downe. There was a brief exchange at the Ball, but a more formal ceremony is in the works for the near future. HCol Downe lives in Wileville, and he is a farmer and a former Member of the Legislature of Nova Scotia. He served as the representative for Lunenburg West 1993-2003, during which time he served as Minister in six different Cabinet posts as well as Deputy Premier. After this, in 2008, he was elected the first Mayor of the Municipality of the District of Lunenburg and served in that post until 2016. Welcome HCol Downe.

# Royal Nova Scotia International Tattoo

The Royal Nova Scotia International Tattoo in Halifax benefitted this year because they had some West Nova help. LCol Butterworth was selected to be the Tattoo's CO, and CWO Brad Rogers was at his side completing the team at the RNSIT. Anyone who saw the show will tell you that they did a fantastic job. Another opportunity for West Novas to lead the way and set the example. In late June, we received news that former Chief Superintendent of the RCMP Craig Gibson has succeeded Colonel Eric Meisner as the Honorary Lieutenant Colonel of the West Nova Scotia Regiment. That's him in the middle as the CO and RSM hosted him at the Tattoo in his first public appearance in his new role. HLCol Gibson started off his life in uniform as a young West Nova at Aldershot on a summer program several decades ago. A few years



later, his career choices led him to the RCMP where he enjoyed a very successful career, rising through the ranks to retire as a Chief Superintendent in 2015. The next day, he attended the funeral of West Nova WWII veteran Ernest Doucette in Amirault's Hill, Yarmouth County. Welcome back to the Regiment **HLCol Gibson**.

In the last newsletter, I listed the names of West Novas killed in WWII for whom we were able to find a family member. These connections are pretty special; it means a lot to the families and to the Association.


