Commanding Officer's Regimental Update

Fellow West Novas, current and formerly serving. It is my pleasure to submit my first update to the Association Newsletter for your review.

Introduction

For those I have not met yet, I joined the Regiment in 1990 as a private soldier and took my commission a couple of years after that. By 1996 I moved to the United States to pursue independent contracting. A year later I was back in Canada doing security work in Ottawa. In 2009 I moved back "home" to Nova Scotia, and in 2011 rejoined the Regiment as a Lieutenant. It has been my pleasure to hold a variety of roles including Platoon Commander, Company Commander, Operations Officer, and now Commanding Officer. In my civilian work I manage the Cybersecurity team supporting the Canadian Navy's new warships, the Canadian Surface Combatant. I am happily married of 27 years with three grown children.

Training

It has been almost exactly a year since I assumed Command of the Regiment and it has gone by in a flash. Right now, our soldiers are for the most part employed on Full-Time Summer Employment (FTSE) primarily in Gagetown and Aldershot. They

are engaged in a variety of tasks including career courses, general duties, and course staff. While many of our soldiers are "away" on task, the Regiment remains highly active. We are running an Infantry Basic Machine Gunner (IBMG) course this summer, finishing our Operating Plan for the coming year, and supporting the FTSE program with personnel and equipment.

When we resume in September, we will carry-on with our typical training including ranges tactical

exercises, administration and planning, and professional development.

Exercise MAROON RAIDER

The West Nova Scotia Regt has been selected as the lead for Exercise MAROON RAIDER, which is the annual Division exercise conducted at Fort Pickett Virginia. Some of us may remember this exercise as ARCON, DIVCON, MILCON, or other names. It speaks well of the Regiment that we have been selected for such an important task, although as I will note later on, it increases pressure on the significant challenges we currently face.

In broad terms, MAROON RAIDER is a combined arms exercise that is expected to include Platoon live and dry training within a Company context. Further training will focus on integration with Artillery, Armoured Recce, Combat Service Support, and Influence Activities (e.g. PSYOPS).

Ceremonial

This May we held our first Italy Day since COVID began. For a variety of reasons, we went back to basics eating a haybox meal of spaghetti under cam net draped mod tent frames, while we acknowledged the accomplishments of the Regiment during the Italian campaign.

We look forward to supporting the next Regimental association reunion when that occurs.

In late May, the Regimental Sergeant Major and I had the pleasure of inspecting our (yet unconsecrated) Colors. The last set prepared over a year ago was found to be lacking and was rejected due to numerous errors and quality shortfalls.

I am happy to say that with a couple of minor corrections the current set looks good, and I will be

proud to see them flying on Parade soon. We have not yet fixed a date for the Colours parade however I am anticipating September 2023, barring any changes or unforeseen circumstances. It is our intent to hold the Colours Parade at Fort Ann in Annapolis Royal, and of course all members of the Regimental family are invited.

Challenges

The Canadian Army currently faces numerous challenges, most of which trickle down and can be felt at the Regimental level. The behaviour of some of our top leaders has been unacceptable and has created a negative public perception of the Canadian Armed Forces that must be corrected in order for us to be effective.

COVID has restricted our ability to train and fight like we used to, and although we have adapted very well that remains a deep impact. Our numbers are, I believe, the lowest in our history at about 110 total strength. This is not a phenomenon unique to us with nearly all units in 36 Brigade below even that strength. Personnel shortages are keenly felt across the army and indeed the entire Canadian Armed Forces. I am hoping that in my next update I will be able to report on the success of a number of initiatives to attract and retain soldiers.

To compound this challenge, the so-called "missing middle" means that as a fighting force, we lack our most key resources: junior leaders who are the backbone of our organization. It is our Corporals/ Master Corporals and Lieutenants/Captains that perpetuate our Regimental ideals, and we are in short supply. That means the work falls on us few who remain to professionally train our new recruits to the expected standard.

The picture is not all bleak. Although small, we boast a dedicated and highly capable group of soldiers who continue to work hard and love the job. Our sense of camaraderie remains strong, and we are dedicated to ensuring the future of the Regiment.

The Regimental Family

Whether you know it or not you are a piece of the Regimental Family. In my civilian work when a term is capitalized that indicates that it has a formal definition and contractual meaning. As such, it is appropriate to capitalize the term here as well. The Regimental Family is a real construct, and its effects have been felt by many.

I would like to close by reinforcing our part - indeed even obligation - to the Regimental Family. It will thrive with our care, or whither on the vine with our neglect.

When we are able, we must support our fellow soldiers, but each of us in our time will need to draw on the strength of the Regimental family. Bravery in Arms

Through the BIA documentary series and my paintings, my mission is to communicate and preserve our rich Military Legacy. "We are all Guardians of the Memory when we engage ourselves in activities of remembrance."



Retiring in July 2016 after more than three decades of CAF service, I began the pursuit of my long time dream to become a War Artist. I started with the 50th Anniversary of the Canadian Airborne Regiment, creating my first short video series, "In Search of Pegasus" and the painting "The Great Adventure". Encouraged by the success of this project, I was set to go to France in the Fall of 2018. to visit Juno Beach and other Canadian battle sites in Normandy. My goal was to create two commemorative paintings for the 75th Anniversary of D-Day, and the first Brothers In Arms series (BIA 75th D-Day). This project culminated with the unveiling of one painting, during the 75th ceremonies at Canada House. Bernieres-sur-Mer and the other at the 1 Can Para Cairn, near the Ex-Coelis Mountains, in Siffleur-Falls, Alberta.

During my first trip to Normandy, at the Canadian War Cemetery at Bény-sur-Mer, I met the gardener, tending graves. As we spoke, I asked this humble man how it feels to be a gardener in a place like this? His instant reply was; 'I think I am more a Guardian of the Memory, than I am a Gardener." Those words penetrated my soul deeply. It was exactly what brought me to Normandy, to be a witness of the past, a "Guardian of the Memory". In Latin, it translates to Custos Memoria. From that day these words became the motto of Brothers In Arms, now Bravery In Arms. I immediately began work on another project right after the D-Day Commemorations. This next project would feature a new video series and be accompanied by a painting that would highlight the Legendary History of the First Special Service Force during the battles of the Winter Line in 1943-44.

During that first trip to Italy in the Fall of 2019, I realized how little I knew about the accomplishments of the Canadians in the Invasion of Sicily and during the Italian Campaign. I would return to Italy, to walk in the footsteps of the 1st Canadian Infantry Division and the 1st Canadian Armoured Brigade, from the beaches at Pachino, all the way to Senio River: a gruesome campaign lasting 18 months during WWII.

The initial plan was to return to Italy in 2020, with a small film crew, to record the series, *BIA D-Day Dodgers of Canada*, in two deployments. First, during the summer of 2020 in Sicily, to experience the scorching heat, and the other in late November of the same year, to experience the cold rain of Northern Italy. Unfortunately, COVID 19 forced an indefinite pause, but I don't discourage easily. I used this extra time to prepare better, to learn more, through a full library of books, and to launch an extensive fund raising campaign to help finance production expenses.



BIA D-Day Dodgers of Canada evolved into my biggest project ever. In fact, I am still at it as we speak, editing the more than 8Tb of images and footage that the film crew recorded during our 32 day deployment in November 2021, plus a second, one week trip to Sicily, in April 2022, when I went alone, to finish recording what we didn't do last Fall. The series will be edited into 15 episodes of 20 - 25 minutes each. A gigantic undertaking.

One of the most amazing things is the extraordinary support we received from all across Canada. I am proud to say that The West Nova Scotia Regiment Regimental Association, is among the more than 160 Sponsors who joined our family of Guardians of the Memory, and is actually one of our strongest supporters and partners. In fact, throughout the series, the West Nova's stories will be brought to light on many occasions. Garry Randall and Ron Stonier have both been extremely helpful by sharing significant details about the Regiment's accomplishments in Italy, and by connecting me with Alessandro Teti, a Friend of the Regiment and local historical expert about the West Nova's actions at Castel di Sangro. He was

instrumental in helping us film this portion of our documentary.



But I must say that my favorite segment about the West Novas is the story of Padre Wilmot at the battle of the Foglia River. Indeed, Padre Tom Hamilton, the official historian of the CAF Chaplain Branch, gave us a very emotional rendition of this event, one that will leave no-one with dry eyes.



No words can express my gratitude to our wonderful Sponsors and Partners during this incredible journey.






West Novas receive Quilts of Valour



The Quilts of Valour – Canada Society is an organization whose mission as a Society is "to ensure that all Canadian military members, past and present who are ill or injured as a result of their service and sacrifice to our country, are recognized and honoured with a Quilt of Valour." They are

a volunteer society who accept and assess nominations and arrange for volunteer production and quality control of quilts as well as the presentation of the quilts to qualifying veterans. As of early June '22, they had presented 18,945 quilts. Each one a handmade hug, stitched with love and gratitude by grateful Canadians.



The names at the right are those West Nova veterans who have most recently become recipients of the Quilt of Valour. Ken Keddy's QOV was arranged by the NS Chapter Commandos Canada MC in 2020, and Harry Arpan's was presented by another organization.



The WNSR Regimental Association has become involved to recognize the sacrifice of our members, and so far Garry Randall has been the lead: nominating, arranging presentations, and participating in presentations. There are also a number of other former West Novas who have had careers in the Regular Force who have been recognized in this way, having been nominated by persons or organizations other than the WNSRRA and we congratulate them as well.

When the RA nominates an individual, we attempt to have a West Nova, former or serving, in attendance or participating in the presentation such as Garry Randall in Sydney, Brad Paul in Calgary, and Ian Haley in Hamilton. This is another good initiative by your RA.
