(from Bde Concentration) i.e. each of the two fwd Plats having unde command two Secs of Carriers and two detachments of Mortars. The combat teams demonstrat attacks on outer posns of the enemy encountered during the approach march. It was quite impressive. In summing up Brig Chas Foulkes pointed out that smoke should only be used to screen movement of tps and not during the final assault which should be covered by fire as long as possible. He also suggested that mortar fire should be used as a heavy concentration before the assault and not frittered away uselessly.
